After spending two days in these listening groups (and taking copious notes), the Ministry Architects team will hunker down to write a report, sharing with us what they've heard about the church's ministry - including assets, challenges, and how we compare to other churches around the country – and where it seems that God might be taking us next. At 6 p.m. Sept. 18, the report will be presented to the congregation in the Sanctuary, laying out specific recommendations and a blueprint for how we might move forward. 

Sept. 30: "The Devil's Highway," by Luis Alberto Urrea



"The Devil's Highway," by Luis Alberto Urrea (2004). In May 2001, a group of Mexicans attempted to cross into Southern Arizona along the deadliest section of the U.S. border. Based on numerous interviews and meticulous research, Urrea tells the true story about how a reoccurring event—an illegal border crossing—went terribly wrong. He writes with empathy and insight about the migrants and border patrol agents, and poetically describes the Sonoran desert's beauty that is sometimes deadly. Regard-

less of your opinion about our government's border policy, you'll find this story heartbreaking.

Oct. 28: "American Dirt," by Jeanine Cummins (2019). Lydia, her journalist husband, and their son Luca live in Acapulco. While cracks are appearing in this city because of the cartels, Lydia's life is comfortable. However, after her husband's tellall profile of the newest drug lord is published, their lives are changed forever. Forced to flee, Lydia and Luca join the countless people trying to reach the United States. This is a novel for our times about life on the run—hard to read but hard to put down. Lydia and Luca's journey is a testament to the power of fear, courage, and hope that there are more good people in this world than bad.

Nov. 18: "Laughing Boy: A Navajo Love Story," by Oliver La Farge (1929). Laughing Boy is a model member of his tribe in 1914: raised in the old traditions, skilled in silver work, and known for his prowess in the horse races. But times are changing. He meets Slim Girl, who has an "American" education and questionable reputation, and despite warnings from his family, he marries her. Inevitably, their different upbringings clash, and their relationship is thrown into turmoil. Compelling in its strength and simplicity, "Laughing Boy" gives us a look at both the Navajo culture and the enduring legacy of tradition, love and loss.

Dec. 16: "There There," by Tommy Orange (2020). This fast-paced novel follows 12 Native Americans, connected to one another in ways they may not realize, as they plan to attend the Oakland Powwow. Among them is Jacquie Red Feather, newly sober and trying to make it back to the family she left behind; Dene Oxendene, pulling his life together and working at the powwow to honor his uncle's memory; and the boy Orvil, coming to perform a traditional dance for the first time. This chorus of voices tells the plight of today's urban Native Americans, with their inheritance of beauty and spirituality—grappling with a complex and painful history, with sacrifice and heroism.

Latin/Hispanic Heritage Month is Sept. 15 - Oct. 15

Very early in the morning on Sept. 16, 1810, the bells of the church in Dolores (now Dolores Hidalgo, Guanajuato) rang, gathering the congregation from their beds into the plaza. Father Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla gave an impassioned

speech, urging people to take up arms against **Church** the corrupt and morally reprehensible Spanish Crown. This is called the Grito de Dolores. Hundreds of years of colonization, changes in regime, seculariza-

tion of government, and many more reasons made Mexicans from all walks of life displeased with their government. While the relative success of the Hidalgo revolt can be debated, Mexican leaders in other parts of New Spain were inspired and emboldened by Hidalgo's Grito and went to war. Eleven years of bloody, terrible fighting followed, and on Sept. 27, 1821, Mexico won its independence from Spain. Not too long after, Sept. 16 was declared a national holiday. On the eve of the 16th, the Grito is performed to commemorate the bravery of Independence fighters. Although what Hidalgo actually said is lost to time, the celebratory version of the Grito typically ends with: ¡Viva la Independencia Nacional! ¡Viva México! ¡Viva México! ¡Viva México!

Arizonans have celebrated Mexican Independence Day since 1821, throwing large parades and parties called Fiestas Patrias. After 1848 (or 1854, depending on where you are in Arizona!), these celebrations were colored by both the Mexican and American flags. This "borderlands patriotism" reinforced the cultural and historic connections between the United States and Mexico. During National Hispanic Heritage Month, the U.S. government celebrates the countless contributions of more than 60 million Latino and Hispanic Americans to our culture and society. Latin/Hispanic Americans are the largest minority group in the United States today and have consistently helped make our country strong and prosperous. Latin/Hispanic Americans embody the best of our American values, including hard work, resilience, perseverance, patriotism and commitment to faith and family. In recognition of Latin/Hispanic Heritage Month, we will host a study of the book, The God Who Sees: Immigrants, the Bible, and the Journey to Belong. In the book, Karen Gonzalez discusses the Bible stories of people who have crossed borders and sought refuge. People like Hagar, Joseph, Ruth, and Jesus. She masterfully interweaves these stories with stories of her own family fleeing Guatemala and immigrating to the United States. Through these stories we will learn how we are called to welcome immigrants into the family of God. We will meet for three weeks from 6:30-8 p.m. Mondays via Zoom beginning Sept. 26. Judy Boroto and Joylee Gathings will lead the class on behalf of Church & Society and Adult Spiritual Growth.

Desert Southwest Annual Conference Report, Part 3

This is the final portion of the Lay Report from Annual Conference.

An important piece of Annual Conference is the passing of various legislation relating to the DSAC. This legislation covers everything from the financial interests of the Conference to the rules that determine how the Conference is managed to various position statements the Conference desires to make. Every year there is a slate of legislation called the "Consent Calendar," which is made up of recommendations and resolutions that are generally considered to be non-controversial and are voted on as a group. This year's Consent Calendar contained items relating to clergy pension plans, sick leave

for Conference employees, clergy health care, housing allowances, and more. One recommendation regarding a compensation increase at the base level of clergy pay



was requested by Pastor Stuart to be removed from the Consent Calendar for further discussion. (Making such a change requires the vote of at least 30 people – in person or by Zoom. The vote easily exceeded the 30 needed.) The remainder of the Consent Calendar passed, and after a healthy discussion, the recommendation on clergy minimum salary passed separately.

Building on recent tragic events involving firearms across the country, the Conference passed a resolution put forward by the Gun Violence Awareness Task Force. The resolution requires that all areas of the Annual Conference be gun-free zones. It also reminds all churches in the Conference that a resolution previously passed in 2018 requires all churches to be gun-free campuses.

One remaining piece of significant legislation was drafted and passed in short order during the last plenary session. News had quickly spread through the United Methodist Church community about this year's group of candidates for commissioning in the Florida Annual Conference. Their Board of Ordained Ministry had approved a slate of 16 candidates for commissioning as provisional candidates. The Florida Conference Clergy Session votes on the slate as a single unit. Usually the clergy follow the recommendation of their BOOM, but this year the slate was rejected because two of the candidates identify as LGBTQIA. The statement approved by the DSAC declares that we stand in unity with the candidates for commissioning in Florida and the BOOM. It reaffirmed

that the DSAC is "a Safe Harbor to any candidate or clergy who seeks it" and that we continue to support the queer members of our conference.

One of the highlights of Annual Conference is the worship services. We all know that streamed services might not have the same impact as in-person services, but the conference did a very good job with excellent musicians and preaching. The first service was Thursday morning where Rev. Dr. Brook Isingoma pointed out that the invitation is always before us to choose life OR cynicism and apathy. Thursday evening Rev. Hannah Adair Bonner led A Service of Memorial, in which those who had passed to new life this past year were honored. The Saturday morning worship

included a homily from Pastor Deontez Wimbly where he encouraged us to consider the difference between being busy and being productive; to think about what it means

to live, and to take time to rest. For many of us, the BEST worship is the Saturday evening Service of Commissioning and Ordination. It is usually done in a "high church style" (which is another way of saying that it is very formal). Bishop Grant Hagiya led the service, and in his sermon reminded us to remember whose we are, and how that affects how we live our lives.

Lastly, it is always a sad time when church closings are announced, and there were two this year. The Korean UMC of Las Vegas closed effective June 30. The membership had been declining even before the pandemic, and then their longtime pastor retired. The remaining congregants will transfer to other UM churches. Aldersgate UMC closed effective June 30, after 71 years of providing ministry to the community. Aldersgate will continue to build a legacy since it will become a second site for Day Spring UMC, with all assets being transferred to Day Spring UMC. The remaining members of Aldersgate will transfer their membership to Day Spring UMC. While it's disheartening to see church closures, this one seemed to have a silver lining to it.

As always, we thank the congregation of St. Mark's for giving us the honor of serving as lay delegates to Annual Conference. Despite this report's length, we know we did not cover everything that happened, or that you might be interested in. Please feel free to ask us any questions.

In August, the Missions Committee approved disbursements to our mission partners as follows:


- \$1,000 to the Thornhill Lopez Center This center on Fourth Avenue is a SAAF (Southern Arizona AIDS Foundation) place for LGBTQ+ and allied youth ages 13-24 to visit to access a variety of services to support their health and well-being. According to the Human Rights Campaign, less than 50% of LGBTQ+ youth say they have an adult in their family that they can turn to for help. The Thornhill Lopez Center provides the needed assistance.
- \$2000 to TMM Family Services Inc. Escaping poverty begins with secure housing. TMM Family Services is a longtime mission partner of St. Mark's. Its focus is to provide quality, affordable housing and support services to vulnerable, at-risk individuals and families. It offers a variety of services that encourage independence, rebuild lives, and provide a pathway out of poverty.

St. Mark's is one of three faith communities to provide this to-go-meal-plus, so we need to collect 400 rolls of toilet paper, 135 boxes of facial tissue (AKA

Kleenex), 135 bars/containers of hand soap, 50 bottles of dish detergent and 10 Bingo prizes. IN SEPTEMBER WE ARE FOCUSING ON TP AND KLEENEX. Please bring some TP or Kleenex to the courtyard, the church office or to the Tuesday ICS collections. Many of TIHAN'S CarePartners live on about \$1,000 per month or less. (*CarePackages contain items that cannot be purchased with food stamps and **CarePartners are TIHAN "clients.") Thank you and don't buy the turkey yet.

Meet Our Refugee Neighbor, Zainab

Our new St. Mark's partner, Tucson Refugee Ministries, has given me a wonderful experience to help a young Afghani girl who newly arrived in Tucson in February. Zainab is 11 years old from Kabul, Afghanistan. She was enrolled at Dool-



en Middle School in TUSD. The school district is currently struggling to keep up the number of children needing bused to and from school. TRM network readily reaches out looking for volunteers to help fill the need in the moment. I was contacted to help this young one to get to

school until she could get on the bus schedule.

I learned about Zainab on our short drives to school every day. I learned she speaks three languages: Dari, Pashtu, and a little Arabic. Of course she forgot, she speaks English too! Zainab is a refugee with nine other family members in a small house. Her mother and older sister are working in housekeeping at a local hotel. Her older brother is in high school and her younger brothers are in elementary school. Her father could not yet come, because he was ill when they were evacuated. Can you pray with me that he can come soon?

As driving together was delightful and fun for the both of us, I became aware that the bus schedule would not be adding her soon. So we came up with a solution. Would your mother let you ride a bike to school? Of course!

Helping Zainab get a bike was so exciting for her and refreshing for me. She can now ride herself to school every day and sometimes let her brothers have a spin.

TRM is always looking for volunteers to meet the need of the moment for our resident refugees to get on their feet and find community. I'm looking forward to what is next in being of service. Our partner contact is John Yost, or you can contact TRM directly to start orientation.

St. Mark's Financial Report: 'Sow a Seed, Grow the Kingdom'

St. Mark's income during July was \$86,840 while expense was \$83,141. The resulting net income of \$3,699 has been reflected in the year-to-date numbers below:

Actual net income through July of \$129,502 puts St. Mark's in a good financial position to get through the difficult summer months. Your generous contributions and the committees' ability to control expenses are showing results. The \$48,600 received in May for the Employee Retention Credit also helped.

The Finance Committee is making good progress on the 2023 Stewardship Campaign, "Sow a Seed, Grow the Kingdom," which is taken from Matthew 13:31-32. The campaign will begin Sunday, Oct. 2 with the first of five videos. There will be more about the campaign in the next Messenger. I think you will enjoy "Sow a Seed, Grow the Kingdom."


2022-2023 Concert Series Kicks Off This Month

Ever move furniture and have to re-orient yourself to where things are in the room?

Ever move houses and try to find what you're looking for after you are unpacked?!?

Ever tried to figure out new habits when your kids go to a new school?

Ever tried to figure out how to eat on a new diet?

Change is hard. Yet, we do it all the time. You get rid of clothes and get new ones. You replace hearing aid batteries. You find a new hair dresser. You buy a new car.
