Save the Date for Merger Vote

We invite you to a special Church Conference for our final conversation and official vote on the merger with Sanctuary United Methodist Church. As you know, our church leadership has been exploring merging with or "adopting" Sanctuary, creating the multi-site campus that St. Mark's began exploring in 2019. This merger would create one legal and official United Methodist Church presence that would offer ministry in northwest Tucson.

This Church Conference vote will take place at 11:30 a.m. Sunday, April 30, in our worship space here at St. Mark's (Sanctuary UMC will have its own later in the afternoon). The conference will be available in person or

via Zoom. Details of the vote and of how to connect will be sent out in the middle of April via email, with copies available on the Sundays before the vote.

Renovation Team Update

The St. Mark's Renovation Team has made good progress on some of the behind-the-scenes projects that will help complete future actions.

- 1. The Visitor Assimilation plan is finished. A Connection Team has been trained in the process that will help the first-time visitor to become a member of St Mark's.
- 2. The Shepherd Project has located 130 people who weren't in our attendance records.
- 3. Five special-interest groups have formed. Appropriate staff have been identified to support and help the leaders of these groups over the next couple of months.
- 4. Staff has taken over cleaning up the St. Mark's database.
- 5. The Renovation Prayer Team is in service. There are four members, with a fifth likely to join in late April or early May.

Completion of these projects has helped us to begin work on the "Next List."

- 1. We are trying to identify all volunteer positions. So far, we have found 79 volunteer jobs. Many of those jobs require more than one volunteer (committees for example). We need several hundred volunteers.
- 2. We are working on a system to better connect with online viewers. A plan is being developed to assess our online practices and presence. Also, it will address possible new strategies to engage and assimilate those who choose online worship.
- 3. Finally, a project has begun to inventory IT assets, including software. We will also identify what is working well and what is not. This will help evaluate changes needed to better support St. Mark's UMC's goals.

Despite huge disadvantages, the Eagles ran through the competition—teams from majority-white schools from WY and MT. This fascinating history is not only about a football team, but also about a group of people wronged by their government who stand up to say, "Enough."

"Eager to Love: The Alternative Way of Francis of Assisi" by Richard Rohr. 9-10:30 a.m. Friday, May 26, via Zoom. St. Francis found a way to follow Jesus that disregarded power and privilege and held fast to the narrow path of the Gospel. Drawing upon Scripture, psychological principles, and literary sources, Franciscan Rohr helps us look beyond the common image of the saint to remind us of the long tradition founded on his life-changing, whole-hearted acceptance of the teachings of Jesus. In this book, Rohr teaches us how to embrace our one and only life, learn to love the life we have, and do our part to make the world a better place for others.

Cross-Border Tour Report

On Feb. 15, seven St. Mark's members joined nine others from the South District for a daylong cross-border tour to Nogales, Mexico. This tour, led by former St. Mark's pastor Jerry Haas is part of the activity of the Border Community Alliance. The BCA cross-border tour educates and lets participants see firsthand what is happening across the border. BCA focuses on social investment (not charity) helping our Sonoran neighbors with their local-led initiatives to build stronger communities and have positive international relations.

Nogales, Mexico is a growing city with U.S. and European companies building about 100 assembly plants there. Many Mexicans have migrated from the south to Nogales, Sonora for employment opportunities.

The tour included a Mexican Methodist Church, a long-term migrant shelter, a short-term migrant shelter, an organization customizing equipment for disabled people, a new housing community built by the assembly plant companies for workers, and a visit with the U.S. Consul General who is responsible for most of the Arizona border.

The long-term shelter has school for the kids and a number of vocational training opportunities for the adults. It has a garden, and organizers hope to open a tortillería. For the most part it was Central Americans and Venezuelans waiting in the shelters.

We toured ARSOBO, a nonprofit that assembles medical devices customized by disabled workers who also benefit

Finance Committee Update

The finance report for the end of February 2023 is as follows:

Balance Sheet Report:

- The checking balance totaled \$411,537 at the end of the month.
- Unrestricted funds totaled \$192,468.
- The Endowment Fund increased \$8,000 and now stands at \$708,208.
- The Endowment Fund is down about 15% from last year largely due to market changes.
- The Youth 2023 Fund was in arrears at (\$3,706). This
 has improved from a negative balance of (\$10,655) in
 January. This negative balance is due to spending for
 their planned trips in 2023. The youth envelope fund
 should bring this fund back into the black in March.

Treasurers Report:

- February income totaled \$74,816 and expenses of \$87,277 resulted in a \$12,461 monthly deficit. The year-to-date deficit is \$5,660. This compares favorably to the budgeted deficit of \$20,804.
- At the same point last year there was a surplus of \$39,423. April has five Sundays including Easter; we hope that will help make up some of the shortfall.
- Expenses are up from last year at this time partially because we are fully staffed, and Ministry Architects has received two payments.
- Administration's budget covering the copier lease, paper, office supplies and advertising is up by \$2,342.
- The conference grant for part of Kim's salary is also depleted.

Concerns:

At the end of February last year, giving amounted to \$198,751. This year it amounted to \$181,591, a deficit of \$17,160. This may be due to illnesses or other factors. We will continue to monitor this over the next several months.

from the products. Co-founded by a former NASA engineer, ARSOBO's three products are: Rough Rider all-terrain wheelchairs built to withstand the uneven sidewalks of the city and the rough terrain of rural Mexico; prosthetics and orthotics; and hearing testing and hearing aids for both adults and children. Audiologists from the University of Arizona conduct the hearing testing monthly. ARSOBO is quite resourceful in getting the materials it needs and therefore minimizing the cost of each product. It is a great example of cross-border sharing to get the job done.

Missions Activity Roundup

The Missions Committee continues to be busy. Various groups have done tremendous work! Market on the Move has SOLD OUT in both February and March (by 8:30 a.m. and 9 a.m., respectively). Both of those distributed food to 150 cars! They have requested additional food for April. On March 18, volunteers at the Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona packed more than 1,600 emergency food boxes.

St. Mark's volunteers for Interfaith Community Services collected 1,316 boxes of pasta and cans of tomato sauce, enough to feed 2,600 people. The Casas church won the "Lotsa Pasta" collection effort with more than 2,800 pasta items collected. The ICS Food Bank met its goal of 10,000 packages of pasta and sauce.

We have distributed funds to Youth on their Own to maximize our donations since they had a matching donation in March.

The Inn continues to serve immigrants seeking asylum, seeking safety for their families so their children can flourish. The temporary shelter is usually an overnight during which the families receive shelter, food, showers, clean clothing, and assistance with making transportation connections for the final leg of their journey. The Inn has been active since December of 2016, and St. Mark's had been actively involved from the start – and remains committed.

3 Years, 65K lbs. of food for ICS

When the COVID pandemic began in March 2020, millions of people lost their jobs and some of the longest lines ever seen developed at food banks across our country. The leadership team at St. Mark's immediately recognized the increased need, and we began an ongoing food collection in support of the Northwest Food Bank at Interfaith Community Services, where they too were seeing record numbers of clients seeking additional food assistance. Here we are, three years later. COVID is still with us, inflation has driven grocery prices up considerably, donations to food banks have declined, and the number of people still seeking additional help from our food banks remains high.

BUT St. Mark's remains consistent in collecting food twice a week. We have collected almost 65,000 lbs. of food these last three years! That is an amazing blessing that has helped to provide tens of thousands of additional meals to our friends in Southern Arizona. ICS and its clients are very grateful. Thank you so much for your help! You can continue to support this wonderful ministry by bringing your non-perishable food donations between 10-11 a.m. any Tuesday or Saturday to the church's north parking lot, or if it is more convenient, you can drop them off at the church office during its business hours.

In April our focus is boxed cereal, but all non-perishable food donations are welcome.



Reflections

Giving and Sharing

I'm part of a "Buy Nothing" group on Facebook. That's right, one more reason to waste time on Facebook! This group believes that we can borrow and give away things rather than buying something. Keep things out of the landfill while also helping one another out.

Since I joined, I've received a bag of clothes and given away three bags of clothes. I gave away a propane tank our home's previous owner left (I really don't need two and someone was looking for one). I gave away brandnew flannel sheets for a bed we don't have, picture frames from our wedding we never used, pots we don't use, and some Halloween costumes our kids grew out of. I received some canning jars (I had quarts but needed three more pints for those green beans I pickled!), a styrofoam cooler, some ice packs, and a brand-new pair of Converse.

Sometimes I think of this group as the modern-day, social-media version of the cousins you would pass your clothes on to. Or, it's the modern-day version of the neighbor you would borrow a cup of flour from. Did you have that neighbor? Maybe you're blessed to still have that. We used to go next door in Flagstaff and borrow from our neighbors but we haven't established that relationship here!

What I love about this group is that we share with complete strangers with no expectation for anything in return. Well, I did receive a cutting from an ivy plant as a thank you from one person, but generally it's not expected to give something in return. And, new life is breathed into things that could be ignored or trashed.

To top it all off, I love how generous everyone is. The people who have delivered to someone who doesn't drive but needs something. The people who give out of their abundance to total strangers. The big and small things that are passed on to someone who can use it. It's pretty amazing how people share.

We need a little more sharing and giving in our world. The Church has set the example of this for generations, and I love that we continue to do it here at St. Mark's. We share our excess for the youth rummage sale. We share our time in missions projects like the Food Bank, ICS, and Market on the Move. We share our hearts in mentoring refugees or school students. We share our souls in small group interactions and discipleship groups. We share in big and small ways, and people do notice.

I invite you to pay attention to the givers in your life. Give thanks for them and share your appreciation to them. I also invite you to consider being a little more giving in your own life as well. What need can you meet? Maybe it's a cup of flour for your neighbor, maybe it's a ride or a card or a meal for someone. Maybe it's an hour of your time.
