Meet the Merger Implementation Team!

Following the vote in favor of merging Sanctuary and St. Mark's United Methodist churches, councils at each church elected members from each congregation to serve on the Implementation Team. This team is tasked with the job of making the merger a reality. It begins its work with several main objectives:

- 1. Work with the lawyer from the Desert Southwest Conference to file the appropriate paperwork to make this a legal merger.
- 2. Empower committees such as Staff-Parish Relations and Finance to do the work of merging, and set forth a plan for how Nominations will fill committees for the new year.
- 3. Form subteams as needed.
- 4. Form community—how do we move from "them and us" to "we"? This is both a short-term and a long-term goal.

Nine people are on the Implementation Team. Three come from Sanctuary UMC, four from St. Mark's, plus Pastors Kevin and Lynn.

- **Johanna Eubank**, a volunteer in the former contemporary "The Gathering" service at St. Mark's, who brings a reporter's eye and an organized mind to the team.
- Roxanna Green, a longtime Sanctuary member and parent of a youth representative.
- Sandi Heilman, a longtime member who once worked in the St. Mark's church office and has a great memory for institutional history.
- Marci Hill, a member of the St. Mark's Covenant Council, who has a background in structural organization, administration, and previous work with area churches.
- Kerry Powers, former Church Council Chair at Sanctuary and a member of the Merger Task Force.
- Mario Sanchez, former Lay Leader at Sanctuary, a counselor, and a parent.
- Kitty Tobin, a newer member of St. Mark's, who is a retired mental health counselor with a heart for people and service in the
 world.



Did you know ...? Gun Violence Edition

Beginning in 2020, firearms (accidents, suicides, and homicides) became the No. 1 cause of death for people between the ages of 1-19 in the U.S., according to the Kaiser Family Foundation, which lists itself as an independent source for health policy information. (You can see comparisons of this U.S. statistic to those of other peer countries at kff.org.) Please also note that sadly, this month's mass shooting tally does NOT include deaths from the Farmington, NM mass shooting on May 16.

Heads Up! Changes Ahead for Medicaid/AHCCCS (from office of Rep. Raul Grijalva):

Have you heard about upcoming changes to Medicaid or the "Medicaid Unwinding" and wonder how this affects you? Use the guidance below to learn more about the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System Medicaid "unwinding" plan. At the beginning of the pandemic, Congress enacted a law requiring Medicaid programs keep people enrolled continuously until the end of the COVID-19 public health emergency. Congress has terminated this requirement, which means states can de-enroll people who no longer meet Medicaid eligibility requirements. Arizona has begun this "relaxing" process to determine who remains eligible for Medicaid and KidsCare.

- 1. Make sure your mailing address, phone number, and email address are correct. Log in to www.healthearizonaplus.gov, or call Health-e-Arizona Plus at 1-855-HEA-PLUS (1-855-432-7587), Monday through Friday 7 a.m. 6 p.m.
- Check your mailbox for a letter from AHCCCS about renewal of coverage. It will be in a business envelope with an address window.
- Respond to any requests from AHCCCS for more information so the agency can accurately determine your eligibility.
- 4. Sign up for texts or emails from AHCCCS about your renewal. Log in to (or create) your Health-e-Arizona Plus account.
- 5. Watch out for fraud! AHCCCS will never ask you to pay money to renew your AHCCCS or KidsCare coverage.

Reflections from a Volunteer

When I signed up to participate in one of the service groups on May 7, I didn't give it much thought. Yes, community outreach is good; after all, it's what we as Christians are called to do. But I didn't anticipate what my assignment—to visit residents in two health care facilities—would require of me or how it would affect me. I've visited friends who needed rehab in health care facilities, but on Service Sunday we were asked to visit people whom we didn't know.

Upon our arrival at Mountain View Care Center, the activities director greeted the nine of us led by Al Anderson. The activities director had a list of 15 residents who wanted a visit from St. Mark's members. We split into groups of two or three so we could spend time with each person and give them a painted rock that a thoughtful St. Mark's member had donated for this purpose. Those lovely rocks were much appreciated. I partnered with Jacque Lucke, who found the right words to comfort a resident when I was at a loss. It was a blessing to have Jacque by my side that day.

The five residents we met had diverse needs. The first one caught me by surprise with her exuberant joy as we entered her room. "You've come to pray for me!" she exclaimed. Not knowing what to pray for, we asked her to tell us a little about herself. She'd lived in Mountain View for more than two years but hoped to move to independent living as soon as she could strengthen her knees. She grabbed our hands when she felt it was time to pray. Never at ease with extemporaneous prayer, I'm not sure my halting attempt met the woman's expectations. Nonetheless, she was very appreciative and invited us to come again.

The next resident had her eyes closed, appeared to be in pain, and didn't say much when we greeted her. With prompting, she told us a bit about the family photos on the wall next to her bed and agreed that she wanted a prayer. Jacque offered a thoughtful, fitting prayer for her.

The third resident was a younger woman who'd suffered a stroke that paralyzed her left side. She clutched her phone as though it were a lifeline but dropped it when we offered the painted rock. That gift brought a smile. Resident No. 4 appeared to be in her 80s and questioned why she was still living. She said that she was ready to die and wished that God would take her. Upon hearing this, I was tongue-tied, but Jacque suggested that the woman's purpose was her granddaughter, whom she'd raised. The young woman frequently visited her grandmother and probably needed her. The resident seemed to accept this. Resident No. 5 could best be described as a fighter. He greeted us from his wheelchair by announcing that his doctors gave him six months to live, but he intended to prove them wrong. He was not ready to die! I tried to sound confident as I offered a prayer that God would give him strength and courage to meet the challenges that awaited him.

As Jacque and I exited Mountain View an hour later, I felt drained, depleted of energy. But at the same time, our visits were deeply satisfying. Those five residents needed us. We did our best to listen and to minister to them as Jesus would ask of us. It was a spiritual experience for me—not something I could do every day but would do again, should St. Mark's schedule another Service Sunday. Thanks to Kathie Barrett and her team for providing this spiritual growth opportunity.

Welcome to Canine Companion in Training

You may start to notice a puppy coming to church. This puppy, named Future, is a service dog in training for Canine Companions. On the oth-



er end of that puppy's leash is either Sandy or Matt Barker. We have been volunteer puppy raisers with Canine Companions for 19 years and have raised 12 dogs. Future is number 13.

Canine Companions is a national organization that enhances the lives of people with disabilities by providing highly trained service dogs at no charge to the recipient. Since Canine Companions' founding in

1975, it has provided more than 7,300 service dogs to people with disabilities. There are now six regional training centers that serve people throughout the U.S. If you would like more information on this organization, please visit www.Canine.org.

Future will be with us for about 15 months and could be with Matt or Sandy. He will be wearing a yellow cape and what is called a gentle leader, which goes over his nose (this is not a muzzle, but like a halter for a horse). We know he is awfully cute, but please understand that as a future service dog, there are some rules for interacting with him. Please do not touch or pet him without asking. As he may be a service dog, he needs to learn that attention will not always be focused on him, and therefore, we will have "no pet" days when he is out in public. If he is asleep, please leave him alone, and do not touch or disturb him. Do not feed him any treats or food – he is on a strict diet and not allowed to eat without permission.

Movie Quest





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Reflections

Church Foundations

By the time you're reading this, my family and I will be abroad. We are headed out May 22 for a trip of a lifetime, combining a couple weeks of vacation with our participation in a Wesley Heritage Tour. More than 40 members from St. Paul's and St. Mark's United Methodist churches and beyond will join us for 10 days as we tour sites key to the Methodist movement, experiencing the effects of generations before us. We'll see the rectory in Epworth where John Wesley was raised, as well as visit the Anglican Church his father served there. We'll visit the New Room in Bristol, the first- ever Methodist building, as well as the Chapel Wesley built in London to replace the Foundry as the center of Methodism's mission "to spread Scriptural holiness throughout the land."

But before that, our family will spend a week in and around Paris. Truth be told, we have no concrete plans for our time there. No reservations made, no structure to our time. We have our lists – Kate can't wait to see the Eiffel Tower (though Ron is casting doubt on whether the whole family will make it to the top) and I'm looking forward to the Musay Orsay's impressionist paintings. We want to take a boat tour and of course, try new foods. The kids keep saying they plan to try escargot in France and of course the hot chocolate and croissants.

Among other things, I'm interested in visiting various places of worship. We are planning to visit the Chapel of Saint Chapelle, Westminster Abbey, and Notre Dame (even if just from the outside), and make a day trip to Chartres Cathedral. I've seen the Washington National Cathedral in D.C. and I've seen the Cathedral in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, but neither are as famed or as old as the cathedrals in France.

The history that is evident in these buildings is amazing. They took generations to build, and those who designed and began building them never actually saw the finished results. They laid the foundations and put the work into place, and then never quite saw the completed picture. Even to this day, as we see with Notre Dame, work continues and the building's story isn't finished.

Every church, even our own humble congregation in Northwest Tucson, has a rich history. There are generations before us who laid foundations — both physical stones and missional endeavors. The faithful stewardship of those before us funded the ministries we took part in as children and youth, and we in turn help to support the ministries that support children, youth, or older adults as much as they fund the ministries we are a part of. The committed donation of their time allowed our churches to have clean floors and rooftop gutters, to offer worship and funerals, and to teach vacation bible school and church camp. Talents shared in our churches inspired us to practice piano or guitar, to find our voice to speak in public places, and even to cook. Generations before us have made us who we are, and when we stop and consider that, perhaps we can stand in awe.

So thank you, church, for laying the foundation at St. Mark's for those who will come after us. And thank you, St. Mark's of our yesterdays, for the work that you did to make us who we are today. May we be like the cathedrals, witnesses of God's work in the world for all to see.
