


Wednesday Morning Study – Questions Jesus Asked: A Study by Magrey de Vega. Jesus is fond of asking questions,

Coming in October! The Heart of Christianity – by Marcus Borg Professor, lecturer, and world-renowned author Marcus J. Borg asked his "unchurched" university



students to write a short essay about their impressions of Christianity. They consistently used five adjectives to describe Christian believers: "literalistic, anti-intellectual, self-righteous, judgmental, and bigoted." Borg, a passionate believer in living the life of faith, wanted to change the students' views and offer them a progressive alter-

native view of what the Christian life can be. The Heart of Christianity was the result of Borg's work. This book argues that the essential ingredients of a Christian life—faith, being born again, the kingdom of God, the gospel of love—are as vitally important today as they have always been, even during this time of conflict and change in the church. St. Mark's will offer this six-session study, led by former adult education coordinator Linda Walker, beginning mid-October.

Open Minds Book Group Fall Lineup

This St. Mark's book discussion group will resume monthly meetings this month. We meet via Zoom on a Friday in the latter half of each month from 9 – 10:30 a.m. New members are welcome! Books may be borrowed from the Pima County Library or purchased from Amazon, Barnes & Noble, bookshop.org or independent bookshops. Co-leaders Celeste Pardee and Ann Reaban are excited to present the fall lineup:

Sept. 22: Welcoming the Stranger, by Matthew Soerens and Jenny Yang (updated edition, 2018). Immigration is



one of the most complicated and controversial issues of our time. Christians find themselves torn between a desire to uphold laws and a call to minister to the vulnerable. Soerens and Yang offer a sensible Christian response to immigration. They put a human face on the issue by sharing stories of immigrants' experiences in and out of the legal system. With

thoughtful analysis, they suggest immigration policy reform that is compassionate and just—a way for us to welcome and assist our immigrant neighbors.

Oct. 20: Just Like Us: The True Story of Four Mexican Girls Coming of Age in America, by Helen Thorpe (up-



dated edition, 2011). Thorpe introduces us to four teenagers in Denver, CO, preparing for their senior prom. They are bright, ambitious, excellent students. All four dream of college and professional careers, but two don't have a green card or Social Security number because their parents brought them across the border illegally. Their two friends are legal—one was born in the U.S.,

and the other has a green card. Each girl views the others as her equals, yet the world does not treat them that way. This is a story of girlhood, friendship, and identity—what it means to fake or steal an identity, or to inherit an identity from one's parents and country.

Nov. 17: The Night Watchman, by Louise Erdrich (2020).



This novel is based on the life of Erdrich's grandfather, who carried the fight against Native dispossession from rural North Dakota to Washington, D.C.

Dec. 15: The Book of Lost Names, by Kris-

tin Harmel (2020). Inspired by true events, this historical

novel follows Eva, a graduate student who leaves Paris in 1942 after the Nazis arrest her father, a Polish Jew. Finding refuge in a small town in the free zone, she helps the Resistance by forging identity documents for Jewish children fleeing to Switzerland.



But erasing people comes with a price, so Eva finds a way to preserve the real names of the children who are too young to remember their true identity.

I remind everyone of the volunteer opportunities that exist through Nash Neighbors with EC Nash Elementary School. 2023 marks the 20th anniversary of the partnership between Nash and St. Mark's. There are several opportunities to get involved and support this missions effort.

School Market – In conjunction with the Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona, St. Mark's supplies and staffs a food pantry once each month during the school year. The food bank delivers the food items and volunteers arrange all of them into a "pantry style" configuration in the Nash multipurpose room and help distribute them. The time commitment is 3-4 hours and only once per month!

Classroom Volunteer – Teachers not only need supplies but could also use another pair of hands. This is a great opportunity to partner with a grade-level teacher and design a schedule that works for both of you.

Nash Neighbors Committee – This committee meets only quarterly and works with the Nash teachers, administrators, and staff to support existing programs and look for new ways to be of service.

- 4. The Whole Rehab Program repairs homeowners' houses to make them safe for living.



Finance Committee News

This summer the Finance Committee welcomed John Wilkinson and Lora Wineinger from the Sanctuary Campus to the committee.

The June Treasurers Report showed income of \$77,708 and expenses of \$86,559.90 for a deficit of \$8,791.90.

This leaves us with a year-to-date deficit of \$23,502.08. This is less than the budget deficit expected which is \$57,006.

The June Balance Sheet Bookkeeper Lois Britton indicated that there would be three new accounts added to the balance sheet from the Sanctuary Campus.

She said she was comfortable with the Canyon Community Sweep account balance of \$148,885.11. Recently, over \$252,207.09 that was invested at Canyon Community Bank, was transferred to the Republic Bank of Chicago and the Alliance Bank. These accounts will provide interest on the balance and ensure that all funds are FDIC-insured.

After transfer of the Easter Offering of about \$13,000, the youth fund ended June with a balance of \$11,632.18. The Logo Products negative balance of \$695.62 reflects inventory that has not yet been sold.

Potential Savings Possible Due to the merger St. Mark's will, in the second half of 2023, have higher income due to the combination of church offerings. It will also possibly allow us to save: First, both campuses will have three pastors versus the four we had in 2022; second, the lease agreement with the landlord at the Sanctuary Campus was renegotiated saving \$20,000 over the next year of the lease agreement (The savings to the church realized from the lease negotiations only apply to this year. Next year we will be again paying the full amount of the lease payment.); third, after Pastor Lynn's discussion with the Conference, it was determined that the Sanctuary Campus will no longer have to pay apportionments. There may also be further savings. They should be more apparent over the next few months.

Combination of the Budgets for Both Campuses Discussions were convened on how to combine the budgets, databases and accounts for both campuses by Lois Britton, Lora Wineinger, and Sarah Dimond, it was decided to keep these all separate until the end of 2023. A new budget for 2024 that would encompass both campuses would then be started. It is also going to take time to work out what databases work best. The accounts would be the smaller problem since both campuses use Canyon Bank.

Finance Committee Meeting Date Change

Due to the difficulty in getting the financial reports completed by the second week of the month, our Finance Committee meeting dates are now the third Wednesday of the month.

Stewardship Campaign

A subcommittee has started meeting to plan the annual stewardship drive that will begin later this fall. We are now calling it a Generosity Campaign.

My doctor told me I need to exercise. I was having back pain, and after x-rays and a consultation, she told me exercise was the answer. I joined the Aquaplex there in Flagstaff and began taking classes to find one I liked. I don't exercise well on my own. I find excuses, I get distracted, I question whether or not I'm doing it right. If I don't have a class on my schedule, I don't make it a priority. So the Aquaplex was the answer. I practiced yoga four days a week with The Best yoga instructor ever, and life was good.

It's been hard to find that perfect solution since I've moved to Tucson. Because I live and work on separate sides of town, it's hard to find a gym or yoga studio that fits my needs. Finally, after two years, I found a class I don't hate at the YMCA here on the east side of town. It's an aerobics class that is different every week, with upbeat music and an energetic but not too energetic teacher who has a sense of humor and pushes us to do better.

Exercise is important for my body. If I don't move it, I hurt. If I don't move it, I gain weight. If I don't move it, I don't feel well. It's easy to put it off, to sleep that extra 30 minutes instead of getting up. I find when I don't exercise, my body lets me know. Just as exercise is important for our bodies, spiritual exercises are important, too. The spiritual disciplines of prayer, worship, study, silence, giving, and fasting are all exercises for our relationship with God. Some of them are best done alone, but others can't be effective alone, much like my attempts to exercise alone. We need the accountability, the wisdom, the community that comes from being together.

In this month, you have the opportunity to exercise your spiritual discipline. Come to worship—three choices on two campuses, plus our midweek gathering at Soul Station. Come pray with others—a prayer service on Sept. 13 or join the Prayer Team. Come study with others—there are book studies and small group opportunities that are just starting up. You can always use the prayer room or the Magee Campus sanctuary during the week for silence and reflection (just come to the church office for a key). You can even exercise your body and spirit together in Just Breathe Yoga, in the Magee Campus Fellowship Hall on Fridays!
