

Staff Spotlight: Pastor Kevin

Growing up in California's Bay Area, Rev. Kevin Lester, 40, knew he wanted to be a musician when he grew up. After high school, he enrolled in California State University, Sacramento, to study music. If the whole "rock band" thing didn't work out, he could teach, he figured. Until he suddenly re-



alized he didn't want to do that anymore.

Feeling called to ministry, he transferred to Azusa Pacific University, where he met his now-wife, Sarah.

"I asked her out and she said no, but I won her over," he said. Now they share a son, Soren, who is 11.

Pastor Kevin says he's been working in churches in some capacity ever since those days at Azusa Pacific, roughly 20 years. In fact, he worked with Pastor Lynn at her previous church, Trinity Heights in Flagstaff, before he was appointed as lead pastor to Sanctuary UMC in 2021.

It was definitely a challenge going from working on church staff to being a pastor responsible for the governing side of running a church, he said.

"Having to quickly get some mastery over a whole ton of stuff was a challenge," Kevin said. "I just wanted to do it right."

Now with the merger of Sanctuary with St. Mark's, Kevin has a new title: Sanctuary Campus pastor.

He's excited for a renewed vision for outreach at both St. Mark's sites, he says.

"Who's missing out by not being here?" he asked. "Who's left out? Who's left behind?" Pastor Kevin wants people to "find a home with us they never knew they wanted."




Scotland Trip with Rev. Sharon and Art Ragland By Rev. Sharon Ragland, former St. Mark's senior pastor
