

New Mission Statement, Stated Values, Goals

At the end of September, Ministry Architects conducted a two-day Vision Summit with many of our church leaders and members of the St. Mark's congregation. At the end of this time together, after much spirited discussion and brainstorming, we emerged with a new Mission Statement, a set of Ministry Values, and some goals to guide us into the future. We approved them at the Oct. 30 Church Conference. Here they are!

Mission Statement We gather, connect, and serve so all may experience the love of Christ.

Ministry Values

Loving: We actively love Christ and our neighbors as we worship, learn, and play together.
Serving: We serve our church family, our neighbors, and the world with our time, energy, and prayers.
Giving: We support our church family and our neighbors with abundant generosity
Embracing Diversity: We celebrate the variety of God's creation and learn from each other as we follow Christ.

Three-year Revolving Goals

These are written in past tense for three years from now. Each goal should have clear measurements of success so that yearly benchmarks can also be determined. Each goal is then reviewed every year around the anniversary of its initial creation.

- 2026 Goal: By October 2026, St. Mark's UMC will create a culture of innovative ministry that leads to 1,500 new meaningful connections with visitors who have connected with the church in some way. This is accomplished through interactions that leave the visitor feeling comfortable enough to give their contact information.
- 2026 Goal: St. Mark's will offer opportunities to engage in worship onsite and in the community. These will be offered through a variety of days, times, and styles. (i.e. youth led, pet friendly, sensory accessible) Through this, we will increase weekly worship attendance to 1,000 on average.
- 2026 Goal: By October 2026, 1,000 people will have participated in a connectional group at St. Marks over the past three years.
- 2026 Goal: By October 2026, St. Mark's will provide avenues to serve in mission, frequently in partnership with other agencies, adapting to a variety of abilities and skills in which 1,000 participate annually.



We invite you to join us Nov. 17 to share your reflections on Louise Erdrich's *The Night Watchman*, a Pulitzer Prize-winning novel chosen in honor of Native American Heritage Month. This novel is based on the life of Erdrich's grandfather, who carried the fight against Native dispossession from rural North Dakota to Washington, D.C. The main character is a Chippewa council member who works as a night watchman at a factory near the Turtle Mountain Reservation. He is concerned about the consequences of a 1953 "emancipation" bill on its way to the U.S. Con-

gress that will terminate the rights of Native Americans to their land and culture. How can the government abandon treaties made in good faith with the Chippewas "for as long as the grasses shall grow?" Erdrich weaves a story with characters who grapple with the worst and best impulses of human nature.



Missions Ministry

A Word from the Chair ...

The Missions Committee has been reorganized to more accurately reflect our roles and responsibilities. We are a twopronged group. One group consists of liaisons who connect with organizations that we fund. The other group are those who are actively involved frequently with functions and activities.

The first group of individuals contacts the organizations and ensures that our donations are doing what we intend. They establish whether there is a specific time to give donations (e.g., if matching funds are available). This year we have already donated to Tu Nidito, Stand Up for Kids, Our Family Services, The INN Project, Youth On Their Own, Tucson Interfaith HIV/AIDS Network (TIHAN), Emerge, Interfaith Community Services and TMM Family Services.

The second group functions independently and ongoing with funding from the Missions Committee. It includes Nash and Estes elementary schools, Market on the Move, ICS, TIHAN, Tucson Refugee Ministry and Primavera.

We have recommended that 75% of the **Thanksgiving Special Offering** be designated for Tucson Refugee Ministry. More than 30 St. Mark's individuals have served as volunteers. Tucson Refugee Ministry is thrilled with the support it has received from St. Mark's, and we are a key faith community partner. We have been mentioned often in Tucson Refugee Ministry newsletter articles, including twice in the latest newsletter.

We recommend that the other 25% of the Thanksgiving Special Offering be designated for the Pascua Yaqui Tribe Charitable Organization. We envision a future where community and tribal members are empowered economically, socially and physically to achieve their goals.





Among many things, TMM Family Services has a clothing closet. We are restarting our collection of clothing for TMM. The bins will be in the Magee Campus courtyard the second Sunday of each month beginning in Novem-

ber. For more information about TMM, check out our Missions brochure! It is available on both campuses and in the church office.



In October, Rachel officially put in our requests for which week and which site we will serve this summer! We should find out what we got in the next few weeks, and I will start the sign up process!





Covered With Prayer

"Ties That Bind" is a prayer ministry that promotes prayer through the use of lap-sized guilts. These guilts are given to a person with a health, emotional or spiritual need for prayers. We believe prayer quilts are gifts of love and prayer, a confirmation of our faith in God, and our belief in God's power to comfort, strengthen and heal. The quilts are blessed by members of our congregation and others as they tie knots in the threads while praying for the recipient.

We ask that those who request prayer quilts ("sponsors") be members of our congregation and are making the request for themselves, a family member, a friend, or someone who they have a personal connection with. The recipients do not have to attend St. Mark's UMC but they must be asked if they will accept one and what they want us to pray for them. We never assume what they would ask for and they may not accept one. A photo is requested, but not required, so the congregation sees who is being prayed for. There is no charge to the recipi-

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New report finds another 115 Indigenous boarding schools, most run by missionaries

The total number of boarding schools in Arizona grows by 11, to 59 (Excerpts from the AZ Mirror, as reported 9/30/2023 by Shondiin Silversmith)

From the remote parts of northern Alaska to the coastal edges of Florida, Native American boarding schools were set up in or near tribal nations to assimilate Indigenous children into white, Christian, American society. In Arizona, the number of boarding schools is 59, <u>the second highest in the country</u>, behind Oklahoma's 95.

Neighboring New Mexico had 52. "It wasn't just the federal government that did this. Of course, the federal government had a huge part, but it was also Christian missionaries who often did not have funding or support from the federal government," Torres said. "The end goal was largely much the same," said Samuel Torres, National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition Deputy CEO. "It was the cultural reprogramming of Native children. It was the intention to strip Native people of language, culture, tradition and ties to the land. That part can't be overstated." Celebrate Native American Heritage Month. A new movie is out based on a true story told in the book, "Killers of the Flower Moon," by David Grann. As the story goes, after the discovery of oil on Osage tribal land, the Osage people began to be killed off one by one. The newly formed FBI steps in to investigate. Although classified as a "Western," director Martin Scorsese took pains to present a picture that was faithful to the heart of the Osage people.

Church & Society suggests this movie or book might be a good activity to celebrate Native American Heritage Month. Note that the movie is an epic, almost 3 1/2 hours long and it is R rated for violence and language.

Voting – More than a Right – It's a Duty

Have you ever skipped voting in an election because you thought it was too much trouble? Or you didn't think it would make a difference? Or you didn't know anything about the issues or the candidates? Or, "they're only local issues"?

 \Rightarrow Arizona has many safe voting options in place: mail-in vote, early voting polls, voting day polls. Measures are being taken to assure the safety of poll workers by would-be troublemakers.

- \Rightarrow Every vote *does* count. There have been some very close elections in modern times.
- ⇒ There is much information available from reliable sources regarding the issues and the candidates. Learn about the candidates, debates to watch, and important deadlines and more for the local election in your area. Mail-in ballots have been sent out. https://www.azcleanelections.gov/voter-dashboard
- ⇒ Local issues are how we make decisions about where we live those issues that touch our lives every day in Tucson, Pima County, the State of Arizona.

General Election Did You Know: With the exception of these four Constitutional Amendments, election laws are controlled by each state: 15th Amendment (Black men's right to vote), 19th Amendment (women's right to vote), 24th Amendment (eliminated poll taxes), 26th Amendment (lowered the voting age to 18).




