
works with is betrayed. This is a tale of enduring hope, survival, and heroism in the midst of adversity.

#### **Year-End Notice for Donors**

Please wait until you've received your year-end statement of giving from St. Mark's to file your income tax return. Some donors may not be able to deduct certain contributions if they file

a tax return before receiving their church contribution statement. For contributions to be deducted in 2023, they must be received at the church by Dec. 31, 2023. This means that a check deposited in the church offering in January of 2024 cannot be deducted in 2023, even if it is backdated to 2023. This also includes online donations that are not deposited into our account prior to Dec. 31,



2023. Please plan a couple of days ahead when making an electronic contribution for this year. One exception—checks that are written, mailed and postmarked in 2023 are deductible in 2023 even though not received until 2024. Thank you!

# **Questions Linger About Pastor Compensation**

There was interest in pastor compensation at our recent Church Conference, so as the person who works with numbers, I'd like to offer additional background information.

Referencing the Conference's Equitable Compensation Form (https://drive.google.com/file/d/1xLsMimsX-CR9QldUGoUprGmPm-b6N5Ea/view) will show that we have three basic categories of pastors: Elders in Full Connection, Provisional or Associate Members, and Full-Time Local Pastors. We have one in each category on our staff.

Referencing the above form will also indicate that the compensation packages for all three of our pastors are well over the amount their years of experience require. As for why St. Mark's pays more than the required minimum, we have come to expect the very best and a large church will require more from cleric than a small church. The average UMC in the United States has membership of 212; St. Marks has a membership of 942.

**Elders in Full Connection** – have earned a Master of Divinity degree and are assigned and appointed by the Cabinet (Bishop and District Superintendents). They are ordained, voting members of the annual conference and perform all the duties in the life of the church at the local and conference level.

**Provisional (or Associate) Member** – are in a residency program designed by the annual conference after completing seminary. They are gaining experience and fulfilling conference requirements, which takes a minimum of two years. At the end of this time, they may be ordained. (Associate Members are from non-United Methodist clergy.)

**Full-time Local Pastor** — are not ordained and are not required to have a Master of Divinity. They do meet conference requirements including theological study. They are licensed to perform pastoral duties in a particular church setting. They are not subject to the itineracy requirements of other United Methodist clergy.

The designations of Elder, Provisional, and Local Pastor are often used at the denominational level. At the local church, we often refer to our clergy as Associate Pastor or Lead Pastor (formerly Senior Pastor).

From the pew on Sunday, it may appear that all of our clergy are the same. They all preach, they all do baptisms and memorial services, but their experience and responsibilities are different.

Associate Pastors may have served the church in many capacities, but they often have fewer years' experience as a pastor than the Lead Pastor. Not always, some prefer a role with less responsibility or a role that concentrates on one particular area within the church. Associate Pastors preach, they teach, they administer sacraments, they lead, and they serve.

The **Lead Pastor** in a large church typically has many years of experience. While not the direct supervisor of an Associate or Local Pastor (all clergy are accountable to the Cabinet and Staff-Parish Relations Committee), the Lead Pastor is ultimately responsible for all areas of life in the church. The Lead Pastor is accountable for all of the above as well as administrative leadership in all areas of church life and function. To quote a well-known Baptist, "the buck stops here."

So much more could be said on this subject. Hopefully, this will begin to explain differences in the compensation packages that were presented at our Church Conference.

# Finance Committee Report By Don Brown, Finance Committee Chair

Year-to-date income is still down compared to 2022. Last year at this time we had collected \$936,830 by the end of October. This year we have collected \$902, 601.

The treasurer's report shows less of a monthly loss in October. The difference in income and expenses was only \$432.

Expenses have increased, as expected, since the addition of the Sanctuary Campus. Average monthly expenses have increased from \$93,912 to \$102,447. The average monthly income has increased from \$88,924 to \$92,262.

We still hope to make up some ground on our total yearly deficit in November and December. Our monthly average monthly deficit is \$7,067.

Generosity Campaign

To date, we have received 182 pledges totaling \$666,514.23. This is a 5 percent drop in pledges from last year's campaign. We still anticipate more pledges to be submitted in the next few weeks. These pledges are critical to our budget preparation for 2024. If you have not submitted a pledge card, we urge you to do so. Thanks to all those who have already submitted their pledges for 2024.

instructions from more nice people. Your purchase will be put into your trunk, then you exit onto Magee. Any questions? Text Lenna Burnham at 305-923-5362.





- ⇒ A witness to gunfire in the neighborhood becomes fearful of going outside.
- ⇒ A mass shooting survivor can no longer attend large gatherings without suffering panic attacks.

These and other much more graphic illustrations are "smoking guns" pointing to an unaddressed, lamentable tragedy of senseless and correctable gun violence in the United States. How long can we, as followers of Jesus, turn away from taking action to solve a monstrous problem of suffering? Are we willing to let gun violence be a normal part of our lives?

And 2023 will culminate in our combined choirs' Christmas Cantata, featuring





Please join us for holiday music in the Magee Campus courtyard before the 8 p.m. service and between the 8 p.m. and 10 p.m. services on Christmas Eve!




