Renovation Team Update

Generosity Campaign Update The 2024 generosity (stewardship) campaign is nearly

complete. As of Dec. 21, we have received 218 pledge



cards from both campuses, totaling \$807,227. This usually represents about 75% of our annual income. Last year at this time, our two campuses had 240 pledges for a total of \$829,230. There is still time to submit a pledge if you haven't done so already.

The number of pledge cards

returned has steadily decreased from 345 cards (just for Magee) in 2020, even as the average giving has increased.

The Finance Committee has been working on the 2024 budget. We are grateful for your support for our church and its missions!

Change in Online Giving We are moving our online giving platform from Vanco to

Breeze as we change our church management software. If you give online (Magee Campus), we need you to cancel your recurring online transactions via Vanco and set them up again using Breeze. Beginning Jan. 1, the online giving link on our website will be connected to Breeze.

Then, as Breeze records your electronic giving, it automatically records your gifts in your giving records, which you can see and double-check via the Breeze app.

To assist in this process, our bookkeeper, Lois Britton (who has used Breeze previously), will be available in the courtyard after services to help you create a Breeze account Jan. 7, and between services only on Jan. 14.

Even if you're not giving online, stop by the courtyard to see Lois for help in setting up the Breeze app. It gives you access to the church directory, the church calendar, and your own giving and pledge records.

From the Finance Committee ...

Year-to-date income is still down compared to 2022. Last year at this time we had collected \$1,013,318 by the end of November. This year we have collected \$997,987. (This information reflects both campuses combined.)

The treasurer's report shows a much higher loss than expected. We were hoping to see a surplus in October, November and December. That would have helped to cut our deficit.

The Finance Committee met Dec. 20 and passed a budget for 2024. This budget is also projecting a deficit.

A Celebration of Generosity

While we have declared that our giving to local, national, and global missions will equal 10% of our budgeted contributions, as of this writing (Dec. 21, 2023), our external giving from our budget and donor directed giving is 16% of our unrestricted contributions.

Harris. This beautifully written novel depicts the Deep South during the volatile time of Reconstruction at the end of the Civil War. Two brothers, freed by the Emancipation Proclamation, seek refuge on the homestead of George and Isabelle Walker, who hire the brothers to work their farm, and

an unexpected friendship develops. Parallel to this story runs another about a forbidden romance between Confederate soldiers who've just returned to the nearby town. When the young men's secret is discovered, it has explosive repercussions. Harris reveals the range of responses of Black and White Americans under harrowing circumstances struggling to remake their world.

Feb. 16: Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Re*demption*, by Bryan Stevenson. This poignant Just and powerful true story begins when Stevenson, as a young attorney, founded the Equal Mercy Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending the poor, the wrongly con-Bryan Stevenson demned, and those trapped in the com-🦏 plexity of our criminal justice system. One of his first cases was that of Walter Mc-

Millian, a young man sentenced to die for a murder he didn't commit. This case drew Stevenson into a tangle of conspiracy, political machination, and legal brinksmanship, transforming his understanding of mercy and justice in America.



March 15: Hell and Other Destinations: A Memoir, by Madeleine Albright. In 2001, Albright concluded her service as America's first female secretary of state. Instead of retiring, she launched a new career as an author, professor, businesswoman, speaker, and activist in support of democratic institutions and values. She clashed with pres-



Jan. 19: The Sweetness of Water, by Nathan idents and prime ministers, warned against the potential revival of fascism, championed the cause of women and labored relentlessly on behalf of people who lack the power to be heard themselves. Albright, who described herself as "an optimist who worries a lot," shares stories that are at times blunt, self-deprecating, and humorous about her post-government life.

Russia Update from Worldwide Christian Support Task Force

The head of Global Christian Relief has warned Russia is conducting religious persecution in Ukraine. A report by Global Christian Relief told about Russian forces in Mariupol. Clergy at the Ukrainian Christian Evangelical Church of the Holy Trinity were ousted by 30 troops. Also, around 500 religious buildings, and sacred sites



have been looted, damaged or completely destroyed by Russians since the attacks began.

Russian authorities have increased Christian persecution within Russia. In July, the United States Commission on International Religious Freedom wrote a report on religious freedom in Russia. It says Russia continues with religious repression at home as well. Russians have used the war in Ukraine to make more laws that end religious freedom and independence.

A Russian Orthodox priest was sentenced to seven years in prison for allegedly spreading "false information about the military." This was because he posted a statement on social media asking the Lord's forgiveness for the country killing women and children. Another Orthodox priest was held for posting videos saying, "If you are not disturbed by what is going on in Ukraine, this outrage – you are not Christians."

Find Grief Support Here by Liesl Scalzitti, Ph.D.

"Grief is the price we pay for love." – Queen Elizabeth II Love and loss are an inherent part of human life. Our hearts were created for the sole purpose of love and love we need for meaning, purpose, and survival. How lucky we are as humans to love so deeply. Yet where there is love, lies the inevitability of loss. The combination of the two defines the very essence of what makes life so bittersweet.

Imagine the parents who fall in love with their adorable baby. The baby is so unbelievably cute that they can't take their eyes off of their bundle of joy! Or the happily married couple who fell in love at first sight. They are each other's "Funny Valentine, their favorite work of art!" No words can begin to capture the level of endearment that rests in either the parents' or the married couple's hearts. In both instances, they feel not only the warmth of deep love but also the natural sorrow knowing that time is moving along.

Moving along in life and watching the subtle changes our loved ones go through is one thing. Losing a loved one forever is a whole other experience. There are no words for it. It simply takes your breath away. What are we to do when our loved one leaves us? How do we survive knowing we can't possibly recreate those precious moments we treasured with that special someone?

Survive you will in one way or another. And, perhaps you may come to accept that grief is here to stay for as long as you live. Looking ahead, there are no road maps or explicit directions. You just take it one day at a time, sometimes one hour or even one minute depending upon the degree to which the grief takes hold. When the pain becomes relentless, you may wish for someone to tell you how to hurry up and get on with it to make the grief pass more quickly.

But do you want that? Think about it! How would you feel if someone else told you how to get over it? How could anyone possibly know when they don't know the anguish your heart feels? The bottom line is that the grief is yours and yours alone. Comfort is all anyone else can offer.

So how do we find that comfort? Family members or close friends may not always be the best choice because they might think they know what is best for you. Sometimes reaching out to others who are also in the midst of grief can be quite helpful as they may be able to relate to what you experience without saying anything that negates what you feel. They simply listen, support, validate, and honor your lived experience.
