
Ash Wednesday is Feb. 14

Ash Wednesday begins the holy season of Lent, a season of penitence and preparation for Easter. On Ash Wednesday, we confront the realities of human finitude and failure, and we confess our dependence on God's grace for salvation from sin and death. This year, Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day. On this special day, we will focus on Ezekiel's admonishment for us to set aside our hearts of stone for hearts of flesh.

We invite you to begin this Lenten season by receiving ashes. Come and confess your own sins and receive the mark of ash as an outward pledge to live your life to bring honor to God and glory to Jesus Christ. We will offer ashes in three ways. First, we will offer ashes for you to stop by and receive as you begin your day. Come to the Magee Campus sanctuary and stay as long as you would like. Second, we will offer a service at 6:30 p.m. in the Magee Campus sanctuary and online, including communion. Lastly, our pastors will announce closer to the date where they will be during the day in case you want to drop by while you are out and about.

Thank you from The Nash Neighbors & Estes Partnership!

It is with grateful hearts that the Nash Neighbors and Estes Partnership say Thank You for your generous contributions to the Christmas offering, which totaled \$15,363! 75% will support Nash Elementary School and 25% will support Estes Elementary School. The St. Mark's community continues to generously support both school partnerships through your donor-directed giving. For the past 20+ years, the people of St. Mark's have given unwavering support of Nash Neighbors and Estes Elementary for which we are grateful!



As we start a new year, it is a good time to review the major activities supported by these donor-directed donations. During the course of the school year, Nash Neighbors supports several project areas. For the monthly School Market, we annually pay \$6,300 to the Southern Arizona Community Food Bank.

In turn, they deliver food (produce, canned goods, dry goods, etc.) to the school which is unpacked, organized, and distributed by St. Mark's volunteers. We have experienced our largest numbers ever this academic year, one month serving a total of 62 families representing 136 children & 131 adults, with 12 first time clients. The market is staffed by 12-15 volunteers from St. Mark's every month. School supplies are collected on campus and distributed at the start of each school year. The Nash Neighbors committee purchases up to \$3,000 worth of additional supplies to supplement what is donated by the congregation so that we can meet the "wish lists" of each grade level teacher. Each year there are always "special needs" that arise which range from paying an electric bill for a needy family to purchasing fabric to support a folkloric dance program. The Estes committee continues to provide the necessary copy paper and school supplies to the teachers through the funds received from the Christmas offering.

Nash Neighbors also provides the principal with \$500 in gift cards to Target or Walmart that are distributed at her discretion to families that experience sudden and or catastrophic needs. The Education Community Home Outreach (ECHO) program has been instituted at Nash, and we have begun to support their efforts with volunteers and with funding to purchase turkeys. You can learn more about ECHO through the Amphitheater website. Nash Neighbors is thrilled to support ECHO and extend our ministry.

The Nash Neighbors and Estes committees continue to work hard to diligently utilize the funds entrusted to them and will continue to find ways to extend our reach!

Finance Committee Report

Thank you for your generosity! St. Mark's finished 2023 within \$3,000 of our proposed budget. Thank you! We are grateful for your financial commitment to the church has allowed us to continue to be a strong presence for Christ in northwest Tucson.

With this comes the difficult news many churches are facing. While we were within \$3000 of our proposed budget, we passed a deficit budget of about \$100,000. As we begin 2024, we have approved another deficit budget for the third year in a row. This time, Covenant Council approved at their Janaury meeting the recommendation from the Finance Committee of a budget of just over \$1.34 million dollars. We were able to reduce our proposed deficit to about \$77,000 by making some uncomfortable cuts to our spending.


For the first time in recent memory, we approved a budget that pays only 85% of our apportionments. We also lowered our commitment to Missions to 7% of unrestricted giving instead of 10%. With this budget, we would have unrestricted funds of about \$58,000 at the end of the year. This is not a trend we want to sustain, but one we felt necessary in order to spend our year focused on reaching new people in new ways. We are a newly merged congregation with two campuses, and we need this year to live into that reality. As we embark on this new year, we need to reach new people and seek income from other sources. Without these changes, we will be facing some serious cutbacks in 2025.




Celebrating Black History

Black Americans have made many important contributions in entertainment, sports, politics and in virtually every field. Did you know Black Americans invented safety equipment like fire extinguishers and gas masks, and things we enjoy like guitars, ice cream, and potato chips? They help define the American culture and are an important part of this beautiful mosaic we call America.

Black History Month was created to ensure that Black History is never erased. Recently, there has been a renewed interest by some groups to omit Black contributions and history from our school curriculums. How can one understand the Civil War without learning about slavery as its underpinnings and the abolitionist movement to stop slavery? And what better way to learn about nonviolence creating change in America than to study the civil rights movement?

The abolitionist and civil rights movements shed light on injustices in our communities and nation. These movements were a struggle, causing pain and even death for Black Americans and others supporting them. It is important to acknowledge the pain and celebrate the outcomes and heroes of these movements.

In 2013, a movement called Black Lives Matter was created to shed light on police brutality and racially motivated violence against Black people. It is primarily a peaceful movement working for change. Upon hearing "Black Lives Matter," some have responded by saying "All Lives Matter". This can be problematic because it redirects the attention away from Black lives. One way to counter this is to speak up and say, "Of course, all lives matter, but only some are in danger due to their skin color."
